It is hard to believe that we are almost a full year out from the completion of the facility projects made possible by the passing of the spring 2015 referendum. We have been very pleased with the results and, once we have gone through a full year cycle with our new biomass boiler, we will provide a full report. Suffice it to say that our dollars were well spent as we already are seeing a savings in gas and wood. The Facilities Committee continues to look for rebates and grants to transition to LED lighting. Last winter the Rib Lake School Board approved a 10-year Capital Improvement Plan aimed at continuous review of building facilities and planned maintenance. Additionally, the Board passed a resolution to create a new fund, Fund 46. Annually, they are committed to adding monies to this fund which will provide for future facility/maintenance of the district facilities. I once again want to thank the community for their support of this project. Our facilities look better than ever because of you!

October marks the mid-way point of first quarter. Students and staff have transitioned well into learning-mode with exciting opportunities occurring for all. As most of you know, we are in our first official year of one-to-one chromebooks (like a little laptop) for students in 5th – 12th grade, with shared devices in the lower grades. 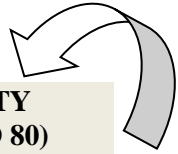

A Message on Safety

The District Safety Committee, comprised of staff and community members, spent much of the spring and summer reviewing and updating our Safety Plan. The staff in all buildings reviewed these updates and will continue to be trained in safety procedures. During the month of September, training occurred with staff regarding roles and responsibilities within our Safety Plan. This was followed by a school-wide practice drill on September 30, 2016, after students were released for the day. A drill with students is planned for October in each of the buildings.

In addition to safety planning, the Committee took a look at ways to make our buildings safer. The end result was a recommendation, approved by the School Board, to add cameras and secure doors throughout the District. Upgrades occurred in September and final signage is expected to be completed soon.

Some changes you should expect to see include:

- Visitor Entrance - At main entrances of each building there is an exterior intercom/buzzer system. Secretaries will be able to see visitors wanting entrance to the building when the button is pressed and will be able to buzz the visitor in. All visitors who want to go beyond the main office in each building will be required to sign in and wear a visitor's badge. A camera is mounted inside the building facing the entrance and will be constantly recording.
- Exterior Cameras - There are cameras facing key parking lot areas. All cameras will be accessible by administration via computers and handheld phones.
- Visitor Entrance (Middle School) - This location has changed. Parents and Visitors will now be required to enter through the door facing the street. This will be considered the 'Main Entrance' for the middle school.
- District Office - Visitors can now access the district office at the doors nearest the office (east end of the school). In the past, visitors had to go to the elementary entrance and be escorted to the district office.

In addition, we want you to know the following:

- An adult is always in charge of and knows your child personally. These close relationships between students and adults are the foundation of our District.
- The school has a detailed safety plan designed to address possible risk events. All doors to the school remain locked throughout the day and all visitors must be granted access and check-in at the main office before moving to the rest of the building.
- Local law enforcement agencies are familiar with our District buildings and have held active intruder trainings in our schools.
 - Staff is trained to recognize and intervene in bullying and student conflict incidents.
 - Administration/Counselors are trained to identify students at-risk of endangering themselves, peers, or staff to prevent an incident from occurring.

As a member of our community, you are an essential part of our school safety plan. You learn a great deal during your daily interactions within the community. If you become aware of anything suspicious or dangerous, please report the information to the local sheriff's department, a building principal, or the district administrator. The safety of our students and staff is important to us. If you have questions about safety in general, please contact Lori Manion, District Administrator.

WHEN: Tuesday, November 15, 22, 29 and December 6, 2016

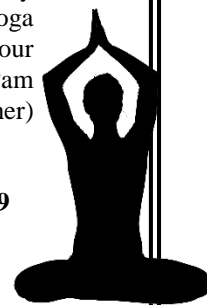
TIME: 4:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.
